Solving Percent Application Problems Using the an Equations (L6.4)

Because 8% is $\frac{4}{5}$ of 10%, the tax is $\frac{5}{4}$ of one part of the whole bar. Each part of the whole bar is \$8. So, the sales tax is $\frac{5}{4}$ of \$8. $\frac{4}{5} \times \$8 = \6.40 . The sales tax is \$6.40. Step 2 : To find the total cost of the jacket, add the price of the jacket and the sales tax. Jacket price + Sales tax = Total cost. $\$80 + \$6.40 = \$86.40$
